What is the CASPer test?

If you're applying to one of the following Deakin courses, you'll need to sit a CASPer test to demonstrate your suitability for a teaching career¹:

- Bachelor of Education (Early Years)
- Bachelor of Education (Primary)
- Bachelor of Health and Physical Education
- Master of Applied Learning and Teaching (Secondary)
- Master of Teaching (all specialisations).

CASPer (Computer-based Assessment for Sampling Personal Characteristics) is an online, video scenario-based situational judgment test, assessing a number of non-academic attributes including communication, ethics, empathy, motivation and professionalism.

All institutions offering initial teacher education courses, like the ones listed above, need to select their students based on academic and non-academic criteria – so you'll need to sit a CASPer test to be eligible for selection, no matter where you choose to study.

The good news is that there are no right or wrong answers to the questions; the best advice we can give is to just be yourself.

The 90-minute test assesses your personal characteristics by understanding how you respond to scenarios you're presented with.

You don't need to prepare for the test but take a look at examples online so you can familiarise yourself with the types of questions asked.

With a focus on the education and care of children aged between birth to eight years, this dual accredited early years degree allows you to teach young children in early childhood and primary school settings. You will explore contemporary issues in children's learning and development, curriculum theories and pedagogies, discipline knowledge and the changing work context within early childhood and primary education. With professional experience opportunities and the option to choose from a range of curriculum areas, you'll graduate with a qualification that's in high demand, meeting the significant growth of the Australian early childhood education sector.

Early years teaching specialisations include: Aboriginal knowledge and experiences, arts education and promoting equity, social justice and inclusivity. Primary teaching specialisations include: language and literacy and science.

Careers

There's an increasing demand for qualified early childhood teachers, with a 22% projected employment growth expected in the sector, to 2023.6

Graduates are qualified to work in early childhood settings as early childhood teachers, educational leaders, coordinators or advisers. They are also qualified to work as a primary teacher working across all year levels from foundation through to grade 6.

Early years graduates may also find

- government agencies
- not-for-profit organisations.

Professional recognition

This course is approved by the Australian Children's Education and Care Quality Authority (ACEQA) as an early childhood teaching qualification in Australia

It is also accredited by the Victorian Institute of Teaching (VIT) for the purposes of teacher registration in Victoria. Students are eligible to apply for registration with VIT upon successful completion of this degree.

Professional experience

This course includes 115 days of supervised professional experience placements. A current Working with Children Check is required before beginning early childhood/school experience placements.

Early childhood scholarships to become a teacher

Students applying for the Bachelor of Education (Early Years) may be eligible for the Early Childhood Scholarship to become a teacher to receive up to \$25,000 from the Victorian Government. More information can be found at education.vic.gov.au.

Deakin's Master of Applied Learning and Teaching (Secondary) qualifies you to work in secondary schools and other youth settings. It equips you with the knowledge, skills and experience to teach in an applied learning pedagogy in secondary schools and other youth education settings in two subject specialisation areas based on your undergraduate degree, and in vocational education including the Victorian Certificate of Applied Learning (VCAL) or an interstate equivalent.

The course uses a problem-based approach that is closely aligned with authentic school improvement initiatives, and links theory and practice through strong work integrated learning partnerships. The course focuses on the middle years and upper years of secondary schooling and has a strong emphasis on experiential and applied learning pedagogies which enhance student engagement.

You are encouraged to engage critically with your teaching practice and be open to contemporary ideas and research that challenge traditional transmissive approaches to teaching and respond to a need for greater cultural diversity and inclusivity in patterns of Australian educational participation.

Professional recognition

This initial teacher program is approved by the Victorian Institute of Teaching (VIT) against the National Graduate Teacher standards for the purposes of teacher registration in Victoria. Students are eligible to apply for registration with VIT upon successful completion of this degree.

Professional experience

Students undertake 75 days of professional experience in an educational setting.

Careers

This course prepares graduate teachers with the advanced professional knowledge, skills and attributes required of educators working in secondary schools and other youth learning contexts where applied and vocational learning are being implemented. This program also offers a pathway to PhD through research training and a dissertation.


